English

Read 'Whiffy Wilson: The Wolf Who Wouldn't Go To School' and write a book review.

Practise your sounds and making up your own funny alien words!

Write a list poem about your hobbies and interests. For example: I like swimming and walking my dog. I like seeing my family.

Write a letter pretending to be a school child in the Victorian times. What was it like?

Write a weekly diary about what you have been up to at school.





Maths

Practise making equal groups of objects and sharing them into 2, 3, 4 or 5 groups.

Find creative ways to count in 2s, 5s and 10s.

Make a pizza and split it in half or into quarters. Could you write a recipe afterwards?

Identify coins and notes. Create a money puzzle.

Practise telling the time – o'clock and half past. Can you draw your own clock? Or even make your own clock?

Create your own hundred square with chalk outside. Practise jumping to and from different numbers.

Art and DT

Create your own funny building artwork in the style of James Rizzi.

Go into your local area and take photos of different buildings. When you return, you could sketch them or print them out and create a collage.

Practise chopping and peeling different fruits and vegetables. Taste them and record their appearance, taste and texture.

Design your own wrap to sell in supermarkets, make it and evaluate





History/geography

Research the history of Stanwick school and create a poster.

Go litter picking in your local area and create a poster encouraging people to not litter.

Identify the human and physical features in your local area.
