We will be continuing to read our Little Wandle decodable texts.




<u> Term 2:</u>

Across the two terms in mathematics, we will be

<u>learning about:</u>

- Place Value
- Addition and Subtraction
- Shape

We will also be continuing to work on the skills from last year such as:

- Re-call of number facts including number bonds to 10 and 20
- Writing numbers as words to 20
- Count in 2s, 5s and 10s
- Count to 100
- Estimate on a number line to 50
- Add and subtract within 20
- Recognise 2-D and 3-D shapes

Topic - History and Geography

<u>History</u>

Through our topic '**Movers and Shakers'** we will be learning about historically significant people who have had a major impact on the world. These include Christopher Columbus,

Emmeline Pankhurst, Neil Armstrong, Mary Anning, Martin Luther King Jr, Rosa Parks and more. We will learn to use timelines, stories and historical sources to find out about them and use historical models to explore their significance.



<u>Geography</u>

In term 2, we will learn about atlases, maps and cardinal compass points in our project 'Let's Explore the World'. We learn about the characteristics of the four countries of the UK and why temperature varies around the world. We will compare England to Somalia and also carry out fieldwork in our locality.

<u>Science</u>

<u>Term 1:</u>

We will be learning about the basic needs of **humans for survival**, including the importance of exercise, nutrition and good hygiene. We will learn how human offspring grow and change over time into adulthood.

<u>Term 2:</u>

We will be learning about **habitats** and what a habitat needs to provide. We will explore local habitats to identify and name living things and begin to understand how they depend on one another for food and shelter.



<u>Art</u>

We will be building on the skills we learnt in last year's unit '**Mix It**'. We will learn about basic colour theory by studying the colour wheel and colour mixing. We will explore primary and secondary colours and how artists use colour in their artwork.



Design and technology

We will be completing a project called '**Remarkable Recipes'**. We will learn about sources of food and tools used for food preparation. We will discover why some foods are cooked and learn to read a simple recipe. Finally, we will choose and make a new school meal that fulfils a specific design criteria.

<u>PSHE</u>

Our Jigsaw PSHE units are 'Being Me in My World' and 'Celebrating Differences'.

<u>RE</u>

We will be learning about celebrations including Navratri a Hindu celebration, Hannukah a Jewish celebration and Christmas a Christian celebration.

Computing

We will be learning about e-safety, how to log-on independently and how to create art on a computer using a range of programmes.

<u>Music</u>

In music, our units are 'How Does Music Help Us to Make Friends?' and 'How Does Music Teach Us about the Past?'.
